Along with a few hooking and color-planning tips, you'll go through all the steps required to create a one-of-a-kind handmade bag, including: pre-hooking preparations, choosing and sewing lining, trim, handles, attaching closures and final assembly.

Hook one of Jennifer's original designs or add your own motifs to one of her pattern shapes. Then, with Jennifer's help, learn how to put it all together.

Jennifer Manuell lives in beautiful Muskoka, Ontario, where she has been hooking for almost 10 years. She is a fourth-generation rug hooker, taught by her aunt, Jean Armstrong. She has taught purse workshops across Ontario, Nova Scotia and in the United States. Her youthful enthusiasm makes her workshops fun, as well as educational. <u>Michele Micarelli</u> -- Klimt Workshop. The fabulous Klimt painting, the Tree of Life, is the inspiration for the pattern. The geometric configurations hidden in the branches and underground

are just amazing. The shapes that just seem to appear as stylized flowers and seeds are fodder for color and texture as well as some mixed fabrics and yarns, Why not take this opportunity to explore your imagination with Michele Micarelli and Klimt. She will be coming loaded with wool and other supplies for your hooking adventure. Laughter guaranteed. Patterns can be purchased from Michele.

Michele lives in Hartford, Connecticut where she teaches and offers specialized rug hooking workshops in her studio. Michele is especially known for her use of color in her highly creative rugs. She has been an instructor at past HCRAG camps and workshops.

<u>HCRAG 2010 Rug Hooking Camp – August 9-13, 2010</u> – Cherylyn Brubaker from Brunswick, Maine joins Diane Phillips and Jen Lavoie as the instructors for our 14th annual camp. She replaces Charlotte Price who is unable to be with us. We will have two workshops devoted to specific subjects – landscapes (Jen Lavoie) and portraits (Diane Phillips) – and one open workshop (Cherylyn Brubaker). The workshop descriptions are shown below.

<u>Cherylyn Brubaker</u> You are invited to work on the pattern that excites you! All styles of hooking and pattern designs are welcome. Cherylyn particularly enjoys hooking in the primitive style with over dyed textured fabrics, but is equally at home with fine cuts. Achieving depth and richness in our rugs through value, texture and color is what she strives for. Discussions are planned during the week on topics such as color planning and background techniques.

Cherylyn resides in Brunswick, Maine and is the owner of Hooked Treasures. A former graphic designer and a certified teacher with the Rug Hooking Guild of Nova Scotia, she teaches at workshops in the Northeast and Atlantic Canada. Her work has been featured in Celebrations X and XVII. Most recently she was a contributor to the book "Pattern Designs for Rug Hookers". Her pattern designs and finished rugs can be viewed on her website -- www.hookedtreasures.com.

<u>Jen Lavoie</u> -- Jen Lavoie lives in Huntington, Vermont. She was featured artist at the Green Mountain Rug Hooking Guild's annual show at the Shelburne Museum in 2007. Her work can be seen in Anne-Marie Littenberg's most recent book, <u>Hooked Rug Landscapes</u>. She uses a variety of cuts and dye techniques, including painted wool, dip dye and gradation value dyes, to create landscapes and pictorials in a painterly style.

In class Jen will spend time with you problem solving and helping you find your own personal style and expression. Her focus is on discovering originality and true mastery of the medium. Class will consist of individual student sessions as well as short talks on process, wool as an art medium, dyeing and the principles of color, texture, line and perspective in rug hooking. Jen wants you to find inspiration to hook from your own personal experiences in life and even if you are working on a pattern, to discover what makes it truly your own artwork. All types of projects are welcome!

<u>Diane Phillips</u> – This workshop will focus on hooking faces, portrait style. The faces will be at least 8 inches from forehead to chin so that you can play with color and expression. An imaginary person, a family member, a national figure or YOURSELF- all faces are fair game. We will have individual lessons as well as daily demonstrations of hooking eyes, noses and mouths. We'll learn how many lovely colors can enhance skin and learn some techniques of dying unique shades of skin for all the world's people. Hooking hair gives us great opportunities for textures. Diane's personal style swings from very folky to realistic, so you can work in your own style or try a new one. All cuts of wool from 3 to 7 are fine – Diane believes in cutting the

size one needs to get the look one wants. She will provide lots of samples and inspirational materials as well as a DVD she produced for the Home and Garden Channel. Come have fun and hook a portrait that will become a treasured rug!

Diane lives in Fairport NY with her husband, Bruce, and four dogs. For eight years she directed the rug school held by the Green Mountain Rug Hooking Guild at the Shelburne Museum in Vermont. In 2009 Diane was the Featured Teacher at the Sauder Village Rug Show and School in Ohio and will be a featured artist at the Hooked in the Mountains Rug Show in Vermont this November.

The fee for the week is \$150 for HCRAG members. This is a real bargain, but to take advantage, you must be a Guild member by the November meeting. It is \$225 for others. We will accept \$25 nonrefundable deposits beginning at the November meeting.

ATHA Newsletter Features HCRAG Members -- Several months ago Guild member Cathy Heilferty shared with us the rug she hooked for her Goddaughter whose father worked for NASA. The theme of the alphabet rug was outer space. Extensive research was needed for Cathy to identify 26 different images relating to NASA and outer space. Since some of the images needed explanation, Cathy came up with the idea to produce a book using internet sites that allow you to upload photos and create photo books. The complete story of how the ABC rug developed and how the resulting book came about is covered in the October/November 2009 issue of the ATHA Newsletter.

The <u>Newsletter</u> also includes the fourth and final article in the series written by Karl and Mary Jo Gimber on their tavern and trade sign rugs.

Catching up with old friends, meeting news ones, shopping for wool and even getting some hooking done was all part of the day. It was truly inspiring to see the quality of the rugs being produced by area artisans. The Brandywine Guild is to be congratulated for another successful event.

Featured Member – Carol Kindt – While on a house tour of the Centerbridge Artisans in Hunterdon County some years ago Carol saw some hooked rugs displayed at Mary Schenck's "Whiskey Run Herb Farm". This peaked her interest in fiber art. Not only were the objects pleasing to the eye but they could also be utilitarian. Carol likes things that are multi-functional. Several years passed and as luck would have it she met Kay Weeks while on a Thanksgiving in the Country house tour. Kay was demonstrating hooking at a little stone church and showed Carol some proddy items she had made. She give Carol the Guild's brochure and invited her to come to our monthly meeting which Carol did that very same month. She was "bowled over by the beautiful work that the members were doing and by the generous sharing of information and advice they were so eager to share". Carol knew then this was a craft that she just had to learn.

The first rug Carol made was a small kit by Hooked on Rugs that she bought at the Guild's white elephant sale. It featured a crow stealing an apple from an apple tree. With encouragement from the Guild members and an old craft book she had stashed away that showed the basics of rug hooking, Carol was on her way. That was so much fun that she started haunting garage sales and recycle shops looking for more wool and anything else connected to rug hooking. The second rug was self-designed which Carol hooked as a gift for her sister, Roberta. The house was the central theme and represented her sister's last name which is Housel.

Looking back there are some things Carol would have done differently on that one but she moved on. Her next project was an adventure into fine hooking. It was a pattern by Jane McGowan-Flynn entitled "The Enchanted Forest". She gave this one to her step-daughter, Kara, as the dog in the center of the mat reminded Carol of Kara's dog, Iowa. After taking a one day workshop in 2007 with Susan Feller on designing fraktur style rugs, Carol found her preference leaned towards the more primitive style, larger cuts. She completed a design in that workshop and hopes one day soon to begin hooking it. Carol's preference for larger size cuts was further confirmed after taking her first Guild summer camp in 2008 with teacher Jayne Hester. At camp she hooked a DiFranzia pattern entitled "The Weathervane" and Jayne was a fantastic help guiding her through the choices of colors that went into that rug. Carol gave this one to her granddaughter, Megan, because she loves horses and Carol loves her.

Carol enjoys attending Guild meetings and has "learned so much from the members and guest speakers and have yet to explore all the many facets of this fascinating fiber art."

<u>From Joyce Combs' Dye Pot</u> – Last month, we discussed two easy wool dyeing techniques -- "marrying" and "stewing". This month we will explore "marbleizing" wool. All three techniques are easy and require no investment in dyes or equipment.

# Marbeleized Wool

Thanks to Karen Kahle from Primitive Spirit (<u>www.primitivespiritrugs.com</u>), marbeleizing has become a routine for many rug hookers to enhance the colors of their wool. This is good for creating different colors of wools in the same background or in the same rug.

- 1. Pick a dark wool, like hunter green and then its complement medium to dark red or burgundy then a light shade of either pink or light green or a neutral like camel or tan.
- 2. Rip each piece into similar sizes.
- 3. Layer the pieces on top of each other, alternating the colors and tones. Dark, light, dark, light ....Roll together long ways like a jelly roll. Take rubber bands or twine and bind the roll in several places (think tie dye). The more rubber bands the better, at least five.
- 4. Fill a pan with just enough water to barely soak the wool. The wool should be dry.
- 5. Coil the roll up like a snake and put it into the bottom of prepared pot of water and detergent (Tide or Borax no bleach). The coil should fill the pot. Use a pot to fit the wool. Push wool down with tongs to mix the detergent into the wool and to wet the dry coil
- 6. Simmer for 30 minutes, do not boil. You can turn the coil or not.
- 7. After 30 minutes, add ½ cup of white vinegar and simmer for another 30 minutes or until the water is clear.

The results will surprise you and you will never be able to recreate the color!

Some colors to marbleize:

- Navy, yellow and brown
- Olive, camel and maroon
- Dark red, light red and dark plum
- Russet brown, camel and eggplant
- Blue, camel and olive green
- Blue, white and brown

Tips From Heloise (aka Lydia Lewis) -- At our last guild meeting, I was talking to a new hooker and discussing where we gather our wool. Wool gathering in the dictionary means the act of indulging in vagrant or idle fancies. Many of us do just that when looking for and at wool. We picture its use and just how appropriate it will be in our rugs. Seriously, when gathering wool we use recycled clothing or fabric. We try to use 100% wool (80% or above). This is because we appreciate the durability and it is easy to hand-dye. Old clothing is great especially when we see how nice Aunt Anna's slacks fit into our rug or your grandmother's dress adds just the right spark to your creation. Wool stored for long periods of time might have some damage so remember to cut out any worn areas before you strip. Medium weight is best for hooking. Coats and heavy jackets can be very difficult to pull through. Searching for wool takes one to rummage sales, thrift shops, clearance sales at fabric stores and buying at shows and from teachers. If a

good friend is wearing wool and it looks like a great piece, I ask them to give it to me if they are thinking of getting rid of it. I have come home to donations on my front porch.

<u>Therese Shick Shares Her Recipes</u> -- Several Guild members requested the recipes for the soup and cake that Therese Shick brought to the September meeting. Here they are.

Quick and Spicy Tomato Soup (Giada De Laurentiis/Food Network)

3 T. olive oil
2 carrots, peeled and chopped
1 small onion, chopped
1 clove garlic, minced
1 (26 oz) jar marinara sauce
2 (14 oz) cans chicken broth
1 (15 oz) can cannellini beans, drained and rinsed scant ½ t. red pepper flakes
½ cup small pasta ( I used tubettini)
½ t. salt
½ t. pepper

Warm olive oil in large soup pot over med. heat. Add carrots and onions and sauté until soft. Add garlic and cook another minute. Add jar of marinara sauce, chicken broth, canellini beans, red pepper flakes, pasta and salt and pepper. Simmer 10 minutes. I let it simmer a bit longer to make sure all was warmed through

Amey's Spice Cake (a great neighbor friend of mine)

2 ½ cups flour 1 cup brown sugar ¾ cup white sugar 1 t. salt 1 t. nutmeg ¾ cup salad oil 1 egg 1 t. soda 1 t. baking powder 1 cup buttermilk

Mix the flour and the next four ingredients. Add oil and mix. You will have a crumbly mixture. Take out  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of the crumbs and set aside for the topping. To the remaining crumbs, add the rest of the ingredients. Pour into greased and floured 8x8 pan. Add 1 t. cinnamon to the crumbs you set aside and then sprinkle over batter. Sprinkle with nuts if desired. Bake at 350° for 35-45 minutes or until toothpick comes out clean.
