Guild Members Demonstrate During the Summer -- Demonstrating traditional rug hooking at local community and historical events is an important way that the Guild educates the public about our 19th century craft.

This summer we returned to Howell Living Farm to participate in the Mercer County 4-H Fair. There was much interest in what we do. Members Carol Collin, Karl Gimber, Gisele Meader, Dee Rosebrock, Martha Theiling and Agnes Wooden represented the Guild and shared their enthusiasm and knowledge about rug hooking. The event is a natural way to spread the word about our Guild. The timing of the Fair is perfect for publicizing our Beginners' Workshop that is held at camp. One of the visitors signed up for the workshop and may join the Guild.

Debbie Adam spent a week barn tending at the Warren County Farmers' Fair with her llamas and goats. Since she was there for 11 hours each day, Deb brought along her hooking project and got some hooking done. She attracted attention and received a request for our Guild to return to the Fair next year to demonstrate. Meet Our Member – Carol Collin -- Carol Collin joined our Guild in 2009 after attending our camp with Jayne Hester which she learned about in Rug Hooking Magazine. At the time Carol and her husband, Barry, lived in Goode, Virginia. They have recently returned to the area and are now living in Newtown, PA.

Carol has always loved old houses and decorating with antiques and country items. For years she savored and collected articles found in magazines especially Early American Life. Hooked rugs were a natural extension of her interest in country décor. In 1997 Carol observed a hooking demonstration by Eleanor Branin when she attended the local Centerfest Craft Festival. Eleanor had her pull a few loops and by the following Tuesday, Carol purchased the rug hooking equipment needed to get started. She was on her way!

The next step was to purchase an instructional rug hooking book. That provided the basics Carol needed. While she is self taught, Carol religiously attends several camps each year so that she can continue to learn and develop her technique. Her camps include Caraway, Green Mountain, Shenandoah, Smith Mountain Lake and HCRA. “I have been very fortunate to work with many outstanding teachers” Carol says. Her instructors include Jeanne Benjamin, Pris Butler, Barb Carroll, Sandy Chevarie, Pat Cross, Nola Heidbreder, Jayne Hester, Sally Kallin, June McKoriak and Judy Quintman. Carol notes that she “learned about hooking with ‘dirty colors’ from Pat Cross which led me in the direction I like to hook. Pris Butler helped me spread my wings and learn to design my rugs.”

Hooking rugs in the primitive style appeals to Carol. Her rugs are hooked with 7 and 8 cuts. She works mostly with new wool, much of which she obtains from Rebecca Erb. “There was little wool clothing in Virginia” notes Carol, “so hooking with new wool was the easiest thing to do.”

Carol enjoys dyeing wool and does lots of it. She works almost exclusively with Cushing dyes. “I must have two-thirds of their colors” Carol observes. Her dyeing is typically done for a specific project, but then she dyes extra for her stash.

“I enjoy designing my rug patterns, but also hook a lot of commercial patterns. It all depends on my mood” says Carol. “My patterns tend to be geometrics.”

Carol tries to hook every day. She likes to hook in the morning when she can sit with a cup of coffee, watch the news and pull some loops. She will also try to sit with her hooking frame again in the afternoon when she can. According to Carol “I am not the best hooker, but I am fast. I like the routine of pulling loops and find it very comforting.” She likes the fact that hooking does not have to be done in a separate room apart from her family. When she did quilting and sewing, the

sewing machine was generally in a separate room. Hooking allows her work on her project while being with friends and maintaining a conversation at the same time. Hooking is a creative and relaxing process for her.

Within the first year of hooking, Carol found that there was local interest in her rugs. A friend bought several of her rugs for herself and then bought some to sell in her shop that specialized in country and primitive items. Others, including local hookers, soon learned of Carol's rugs by word of mouth. "I priced my rugs according to the economy and the town not by the suggested formulas. For me, I love the process of hooking and the sales help offset my expenses. I am also open to bartering, if someone wants to."

Rug hooking is Carol's primary activity. In the past, she has also done counted cross stitch, punch needle and quilting. Both Carol and Barry are committed golfers. In Virginia, they golfed several days a week. They look forward to resuming their golfing in Bucks County once they get settled down.

Carol and Barry will be married 50 years in January. Barry is a retired physical education teacher. Carol is a retired registered nurse. They have three children – Rachelle, Russell and Richard -- and three grandchildren. Rachelle lives in Furlong, PA with her husband, Tony, and their children Grace, age 12, and Alex, age 9. Russell is an executive chef who lives in New Jersey. Richard died in December 2009 following complications from cancer surgery. His daughter Reese, age 12, has one of her grandmother's rugs as do the other two grandchildren.

Carol looks forward to being an active Guild member. She already joined members who demonstrated rug hooking at the recent Mercer County 4-H Fair. Carol was also at camp last month. Hooking Information & Techniques

From Nina's Notebook – Greetings from Nova Scotia! When I was teaching, September was the cruelest month. It meant trading shorts and tee shirts for skirts and panty hose. Being retired, September now means that I can stay in Nova Scotia, my summer home, for one more month. It means sitting on my deck and enjoying warm days and cool nights.

I begin to watch for the first signs of fall with turning leaves and the coloring of the rose hips. One of the hooking groups to which I belong is planning an exhibit at our island museum next year. In addition to individual pieces we are also planning an exhibit of pieces, size 16 x16 on the theme "I see the world in shades of.....". Each hooker is free to choose the color of their choice and create a piece using many shades of that particular color.

Right now I am leaning toward the shade of green. Perhaps a small house of celery green with dark green roof set in a field with many shades of green with dark trees in the background. Then there is blue with sea and sky. A blue boat sailing on the sea... What color would you choose, and what is the scene that you would create?

Tips from Heloise – Burlap has fallen out of favor as the preferred backing for hooked rugs since it becomes brittle with age and develops dry rot. Today most rug hookers prefer to hook on linen or monk’s cloth because it is so much more durable.

Earlier this summer Heloise visited with Jeannine Happe (Two Old Crows) and Karen Worthington (The Blue Tulip) who were set up at the Lancaster Historical House and Craft Show. Karen shared that she recently discovered that the linen backing on one of her rugs disintegrated. The water bowl for her dog sat on the rug and apparently became damp from water splashed as her dog used the bowl. Over time the dampness caused the linen to fail. The lesson to be learned is that linen may not develop dry rot, but will rot from continued exposure to dampness.

General Guidelines for Hooking -- One of the exercises in Iris Simpson’s camp workshop was to review a list of hooking guidelines that she has collected and to add additional tips to the list. The results of the exercise follow below.

1. When possible start hooking in the center of the pattern not on the edge. This will keep the backing from buckling in the center.
2. Hook motifs first and then the background. Hook one or two rows around the straight edges of a rectangular piece. Hook the background horizontally, vertically, or higgledy-piggledy (lazy Ss or Ss and Cs.).
3. Hook what is on top (i.e., what is closest to you) first. This is usually lighter and brighter than what is behind.
4. Most often strips of material up to 18 inches are used. It is your choice. Vary the length of the strips so that there is variation as to where the tails appear.
5. The height of the loops is for you to decide. It is often said that the height of the loop equals the width of your cut strip. You can use all cuts in a rug but make sure they all reach the same height. This will reduce the wear and tear on rugs that will be on the floor. This is less important for wall hangings.
6. Cut your ends off after they are surrounded by other loops. Bring all ends to the top if you are hooking a rug; a wall hanging or cushion can have ends at the back.
7. Don’t pack loops; they should kiss each other not “madly hug each other”.
8. Avoid skipping across the back (crossovers) as this causes a bump on the back and is where your rug will first begin to wear. Crossovers are OK for wall hangings.
9. You can “hide ends” to avoid a long strip of cut ends. This is especially important in Orientals if you do not wish to turn your wool strip.
10. When working in straight lines make sure you “stagger” the strips. Don’t break at the same place.
11. Use a “holding line” when you have not decided on a color either at the border or within the pattern. It is easier to hook up to loops than to a space.

12. Wash new or recycled materials before using. This is not needed for dyed wool since it is washed in the dyeing process.
13. Roll you rugs right side out. Never fold as this puts a strain on the backing, especially if it is burlap.
14. Do not be afraid to pull out! But DO wait a while before doing so. Often things do not look quite right until other colors are put in. Pull the strips from the back. This preserves the strips so that they can be used again. Pulling from the top tends to damage the strips.
15. One way to destroy moth eggs is to put the rug or wool in the freezer for 48 hours. Shake it out and put back for another 48 hours.
16. Plaid and textured wool hooks darker than it looks. Solid color wool hooks a shade lighter than it looks because of the light reflection.

REMEMBER – These are only hints and tips, not rules!
